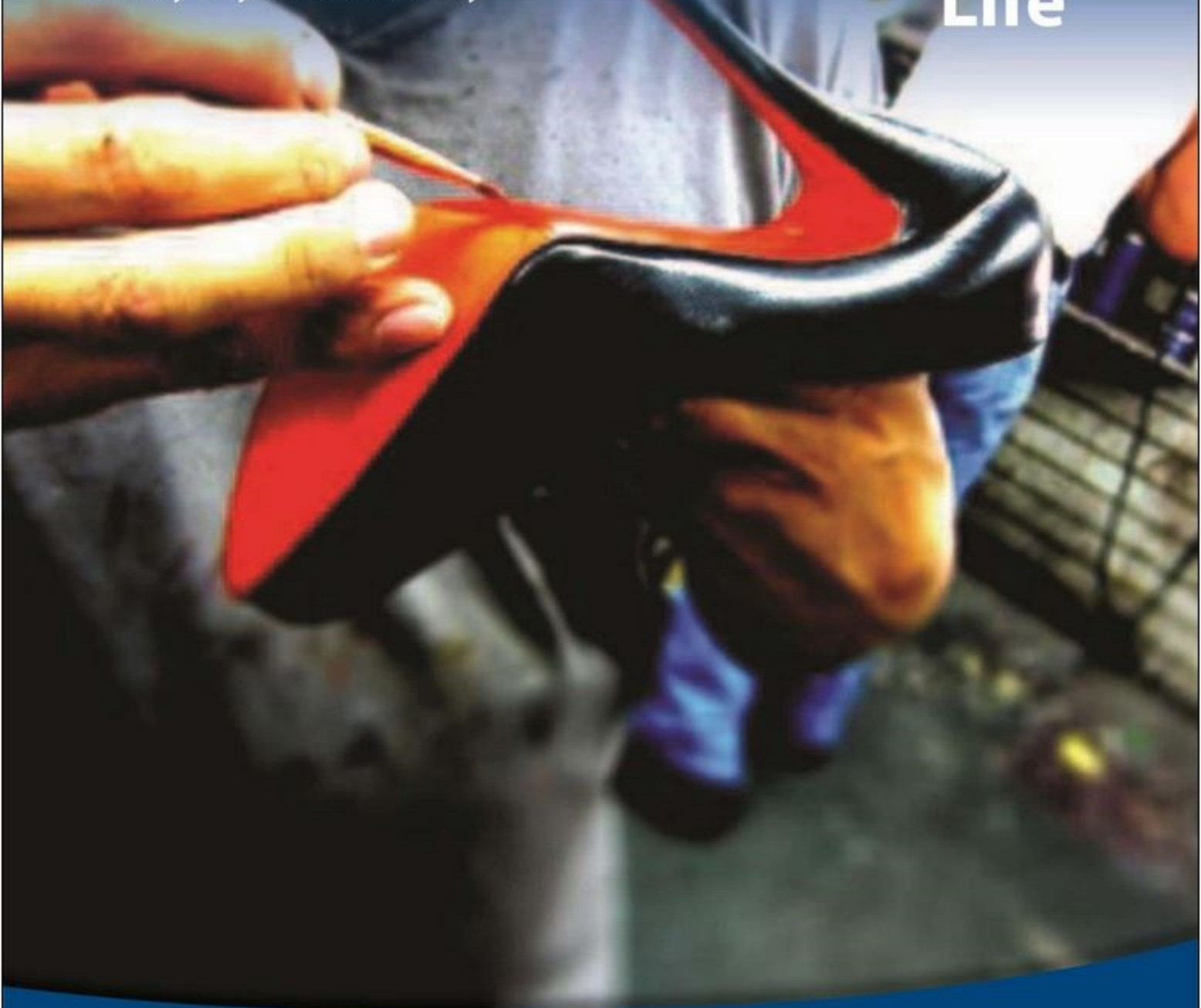

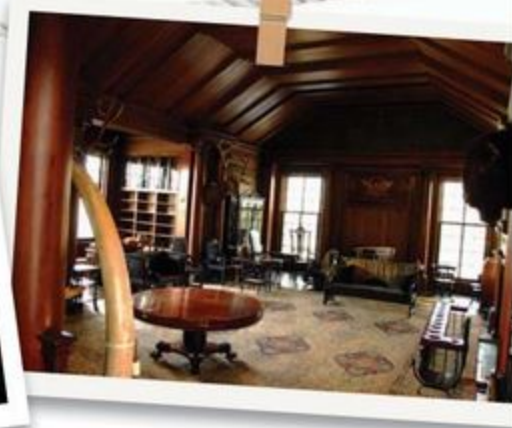

Roosevelt's Mansion on the Hill

President Theodore Roosevelt is an international icon. So a commission from the National Park Service to photograph his Sagamore Hill home was a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity especially since the mansion was nearly vacant— a historically rare event. —*Xiomaro*.

Xio also mentioned about his solo walk through the mansion, "It was a sobering experience to walk alone in the rooms where TR carried the weight of the nation's affairs."
